Introduction

This year was a Presidential Election year with former President Donald Trump and Ohio Senator J.D. Vance running against Vice President Kamala Harris and Minnesota Governor Tim Walz. Former President Trump and Senator Vance won the electoral college. Vice President Harris and Governor Walz won the state of Minnesota by 5%. Voter turnout in Minnesota was down slightly in strong DFL counties and higher in strong GOP counties compared to 2020. The DFL won the suburbs for 4th cycle in a row, but by fewer than in 2020 and 2022.

Governor Walz will return to Minnesota to continue to serve the final two years of his term as Governor. Lieutenant Governor Flanagan will remain the Lieutenant Governor for the next two years. None of Minnesota's constitutional officers were on the ballot. The Attorney General, State Auditor, and Secretary of State will be on the ballot again in 2026.

Aside from the presidential race, Minnesota Senator Amy Klobuchar faced former professional basketball player Royce White in her reelection race. Senator Klobuchar won by more than 15% of the vote. She out-performed the Harris/Walz Presidential ticket by 5%, 136,001 votes, but she underperformed her 2018 numbers.

Each of Minnesota's eight congressional seats were on the ballot. Congressman Dean Phillips (DFL) did not run for reelection to represent Minnesota's Third Congressional District. In Minnesota's Third Congressional District, State Senator Kelly Morrison (DFL) defeated former District Court Judge Tad Jude (R) by 70,000 votes. U.S. Representatives Brad Finstad, Angie Craig, Ilhan Omar, Tom Emmer, Michelle Fischbach, Betty McCollum, and Pete Stauber all won their respective races.

There was one Minnesota Senate seat on the ballot this year because Senator Kelly Morrison (S.D. 45) resigned from her Senate seat to run for Dean Phillips seat in U.S. Congress (C.D. 3). Governor Tim Walz called for a special election to take place concurrently with the general election. Following Senator Morrison's resignation, the Senate was tied with 33 Republicans and 33 Democrats. Former State Senator Ann Johnson Stewart (DFL) defeated Kathleen Fowke (R) by 2,818 votes.

The entirety of the Minnesota House of Representatives was on the ballot. Several notable members retired from the Minnesota House of Representatives, leaving big shoes, and seats, to be filled. Prior to the election, the DFL held a six-seat majority in the Minnesota House of Representatives. With Donald Trump overperforming his 2020 numbers in nearly every county, the Minnesota Republicans were able to hold all their seats and flip three seats. There are two Minnesota House seats that appear to have been won by DFL legislators Wolgamott and Brand where the margin is so close that they trigger automatic recounts. If those recounts do not change the results of those races where the DFL holds minor leads, the Minnesota House of Representatives is poised to be tied 67-67.

The House has only been tied once in Minnesota's history. Following the 1978 election when the House was tied, an agreement was reached such that the Republican party chose the Speaker of the House, and the DFL party chaired the three most powerful House committees at the time: Rules, Taxes, and Appropriations. The Republican party named the DFL Chairs of the Appropriations and Tax committees and received a one-vote majority in Taxes. If the House remains tied after the recounts it is unknown how the current House DFL and Republican leadership will go about structuring things for the 2025 session. The 2025 legislative session begins January 14, 2025. The legislature will be required to pass a balanced budget by July 1 to avoid a government shutdown.

There were two contested Supreme Court Races, three Appellate Courts races, five contested District Court races, and one open District Court seat. All incumbent judges won reelection. In the Sixth Judicial District open seat vacated by Dale Harris it appears that civil attorney Shawn Reed won the judgeship defeating Duluth City Attorney Gunnar Johnson.

Minnesotans approved a Constitutional Amendment to renew the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund, a program that gives 40% of the state's lottery profits to the Trust Fund to support conservation efforts. Voters approved the amendment with 77.5% of voters voting in favor of the amendment.

Key Races

Senate District 45 - Ann Johnson Stewart (DFL) v. Kathleen Fowke (R) - Open

The Minnesota Senate had one open seat following the resignation of Senator Kelly Morrison (DFL) to run for Minnesota's 3rd Congressional District. Former Senator Ann Johnson Stewart (DFL) won the general election with 52.5% of the vote. Johnson Stewart is a civil engineer, an educator, and a former small business owner. She defeated real estate agent Kathleen Fowke (R).

District 14B - Representative Dan Wolgamott (DFL) v. Sue Ek (R) - Subject to Recount

Representative Dan Wolgamott is the Vice Chair of the Higher Education Finance and Policy Committee. Representative Wolgamott coaches football at Sauk Rapids-Rice High School. Republican challenger, Sue Ek, has served on the Transportation Infrastructure Advisory Board in St. Cloud and on her church council. She is a communications director for Catholic Women and Couples Natural Family Planning. Wolgamott is currently ahead of Ek by 28 votes. A mandatory recount will take place to confirm a winner in District 14B.

District 18A - Representative Jeff Brand (DFL) v. Erica Schwartz (R) - Incumbent Lost

Representative Jeff Brand lost his reelection to first-time candidate Erica Schwartz. Brand was running for reelection to serve a third term in the Minnesota House of Representatives. Representative Brand was first elected to the Minnesota House in 2018, lost his election in 2020, and defeated the Republican incumbent, Susan Akland, in 2022. Representative Brand serves as the Vice Chair of the Workforce Development Finance and Policy Committee and is a member of the Taxes, Transportation, and Environment committees. Representative Brand is a small business

owner and former Saint Peter City Councilmember. Schwartz is a brain tumor survivor, volunteers with her local Habitat for Humanity, and owns and operates a local business. Brand was the only incumbent to lose their reelection.

District 54A - Representative Brad Tabke (DFL) vs. Aaron Paul (R) - Subject to Recount

Representative Brad Tabke has served two terms in the Minnesota House. He was first elected in 2018; he lost his reelection bid in 2020 to Republican Erik Mortenson who Tabke then defeated in 2022. Representative Tabke is the Vice Chair of the Transportation Committee. Representative Tabke has served as the Mayor of Shakopee and the Shakopee Parks and Recreation Board Chair. Aaron Paul is a first time Minnesota House candidate. He is a Bloomington Police Officer and former school resource officer. He is the President of the Association of Training Officers of Minnesota, and a member of the Shakopee Lions Club. This race is subject to a recount, Tabke is currently ahead of Paul by 13 votes.

District 7B - Lorrie Janatopoulos (DFL) v. Cal Warwas (R) - Seat Flip

Representative Dave Lislegard (DFL) did not run for reelection. District 7B was the only DFL House district in Minnesota that also supported President Donald Trump in the 2020 election. Cal Warwas is a first-time candidate for Minnesota House. Warwas is a third-generation miner and union member. Laurie Janatopoulos (DFL) was a former employee of the Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED), and she lives in Eveleth. Warwas won the seat with 56.4% of the vote.

District 26A - Sarah Kruger (DFL) v. Aaron Repinski (R) - Seat Flip

Long time DFL legislator, Gene Pelowski (DFL), announced his retirement from the House. Representative Pelowski was first elected in 1986. Sarah Kruger (DFL) was a first-time candidate for the Minnesota House of Representatives. Kruger is the Chief of Staff at FairVote Minnesota. Aaron Repinski was a first-time candidate for the Minnesota House of Representatives. Repinski is a Winona City Councilmember, ordained minister, small business owner, and part-time bailiff. Repinski won with 52.9% of the vote.

Judicial Officers

There are 322 judicial officers in Minnesota. Approximately one-third of judicial seats were on this November's ballot for election and all levels of court are represented, Minnesota Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, and District Court. There were ten appellate seats up for statewide election and ninety-three district court seats up for election this year. There are two contested Supreme Court Races, three Appellate Courts races, five contested District Court races, and one open seat. All incumbent judges won reelection. In the Sixth Judicial District open seat vacated by Dale Harris it appears that civil attorney Shawn Reed won the judgeship defeating Duluth City Attorney Gunnar Johnson.
